




































Item concerned The Dell and/or Clymping Dene – 'This is Walter Norman White-Thompson pictured with his Nr 1 Bi-Plane January 1913 – he once resided at The Dell Harlington Road West, Feltham'



He was one a many over the years that lived occasionally at a property know as either The Dell or Clymping Dene, I say either because there is some doubt which was which. 'ClympIng Dene could have been the Dell and the Dell Clymping Dene - the description in Buster Lloyd Jones's book '<u>The Animals</u> <u>came in one by One'</u> describes the house and grounds as being in 10 acres of grounds "a Spinney' a Paddock and a colossal kitchen garden and wide stretches of evergreen wilderness – a huge lake 21 feet deep and he continues "*fishermen treasured it*" As can be seen there is much more to be researched which we shall bring to you later this year,








<u>Two Bridges Farm Bedfont</u>, AR the following is in response to a recent email enquiry regarding Two Bridges farm Bedfont 'in which' a Mr Cheesman who is the Bio-diversity Manager for Heathrow Airport, asked of the history of the farm - my response is as follows dear Mr Cheeseman

The below is a section of the Bedfont enclosure map of 1817 as it pertains to the area that became known as Two Bridges Farm

Clearly shown are the two rivers, Longford River 'bottom' and the much straighter river Duke of Northumberland's 'above'.

Parcel or Lot nr 276 on the enclosure map is generally the area of Two Bridges Farm. It measured but 3acres and was purchased 'freehold' by George Engleheart. (1750–1829) Engleheart was a <u>English</u> painter of <u>portrait miniatures</u>) and lived at a large house along Staines Road Bedfont. We hope to continue this item of interest at the March meeting following further correspondence from Mr Cheeseman
